

PARENT, CARER AND VISITOR CODE OF CONDUCT

At Heath Farm School (HFS) we are very fortunate to have supportive and friendly parents and carers. They recognise that educating children is a process that involves a partnership between home and school and understand the importance of a good working relationship to equip children with the necessary skills for adulthood. For these reasons we welcome and encourage parents and carers to participate fully in the life of the school.

The purpose of this policy is to provide a reminder to all parents and visitors to our school about expected conduct so that we can work together to ensure a safe and positive school environment for our children.

Respect and concern for others and their rights

We expect parents, carers and visitors to show respect and concern for others by:-

- Supporting the respectful ethos of our school by setting a good example in their own speech and behaviour towards all members of the school community.
- Working together with teachers for the benefit of children. This includes approaching the school to resolve any issues of concern and to discuss and clarify specific events in order to bring about a positive solution.
- Reinforcing the school's policy on behaviour.
- Respecting the learning environment appropriately (both in school and off site).
- Parking with consideration and respect for others when delivering and collecting children from school.

In order to support a peaceful and safe school environment, the school does not tolerate:-

- Disruptive behaviour which interferes with the operation of a classroom, an office area or any other part of the school grounds;
- Use of loud and/or offensive language or displaying bad temper;
- Approaching someone else's child in order to discuss or chastise them because of the actions of this child towards their own child. (Such an approach to a child may be seen to be an assault on that child and may have legal consequences).
- Threatening harm or the use of physical aggression towards another adult or child. This includes approaching someone else's child in order to discuss or chastise them and physical punishment against your own child on school premises, (some actions may constitute an assault with legal consequences);

- Damaging or destroying school property;
- Abusive, threatening, malicious or inflammatory emails, phone or social network messages;
- Smoking and consumption of alcohol or drugs or accessing the school site whilst intoxicated;

The above behaviours on school premises will be reported to the Senior Leadership Team in the school and governors may prohibit an offending adult from entering the school grounds to safeguard our school community.

We trust that parents, carers and visitors will fully support this Code of Conduct.

Appendix 1:

Social media websites are being used increasingly to fuel campaigns and complaints against schools, Headteachers, school staff and in some cases other parents, carers, pupils or other professionals. Heath Farm School (HFS) considers the use of social media websites being used in this way as unacceptable and not in the best interests of the children or the whole school community. Any concerns you may have must be made through the appropriate channels by speaking to the class teacher, the Headteacher or the Chair of Governors, so they can be dealt with fairly, appropriately and effectively for all concerned.

In the event that any pupil, parent or carer of a children being educated at HFS is found to be posting libellous or defamatory comments on Facebook or other social network sites, they will be reported to the appropriate 'report abuse' section of the network site. All social network sites make clear rules about the content which can be posted on the site and they provide robust mechanisms to report content or activity that breaches this. The school will also expect that any parent/carers or pupil removes such comments immediately.

In serious cases the school will also consider its legal options to deal with any such misuse of social networking and other sites. Additionally, and perhaps more importantly, is the issue of cyber bullying and the use by any member of the school community to publicly humiliate another by inappropriate social network entry. We will take and deal with this as a serious incident of school bullying.
